

Authorship

The Editors of Systemist® consider that an author is a living person, who has actively contributed to the process of creating a submitted article. In the fields of Systemic research and practice, group collaboration and discussion will often be at the heart of authorship. It is recognized that it may not always be possible to define and describe discrete efforts by individual team members. In the interests of transparency, the Authors should include a contribution statement on the Title Page of the work, which makes clear the role played by each of them in production of the material to be submitted.

It should be noted that the following would never be considered to be an author of a submitted piece:

- Large Language Models (LLMs) such as ChatGP, or other virtual entities. Authorship carries with it accountability for the work, which cannot be effectively applied to LLMs or other virtual entities.
- A person whose only contribution is to supervise, encourage or review the research or composition. Authors should provide an acknowledgement of any such assistance on the title page.

Where LLMs have been used in preparing the work to be submitted, this should be properly documented in the Methods (or other suitable alternative part) of the manuscript.

One author is assigned as Corresponding Author and acts on behalf of all co-authors and ensures that questions related to the accuracy or integrity of any part of the work are appropriately addressed.

The Corresponding Author is responsible for the following requirements:

- ensuring that all listed authors have approved the manuscript before submission, including the names and order of authors
- managing all communication between the Journal and all co-authors, before and after publication*
- providing transparency on re-use of material and mention any unpublished material (for example manuscripts in press) included in the manuscript in a cover letter to the Editor
- making sure disclosures, declarations and transparency on data statements from all authors are included in the manuscript as appropriate (see above)
- The corresponding author should be prepared to collect documentation of compliance with ethical standards and send if requested during peer review or after publication.

* The requirement of managing all communication between the journal and all co-authors during submission and proofing may be delegated to a Contact or Submitting Author. In this case please make sure the Corresponding Author is clearly indicated in the manuscript.

Authors are welcome to suggest suitable reviewers and/or request the exclusion of certain individuals when they submit their manuscripts. When suggesting reviewers, authors should make sure they are totally independent and not connected to the work in any way. It is strongly recommended to suggest a mix of reviewers from different countries and different institutions.

When suggesting reviewers, the Corresponding Author must provide an institutional email address for each suggested reviewer, or, if this is not possible to include other means of verifying the identity such as a link to a personal homepage, a link to the publication record or a researcher or author ID in the submission letter. Please note that the Journal may not use the suggestions, but suggestions are appreciated and may help facilitate the peer review process.
